

LATEST NEWS

- An escalation of violence in several locations was noted by the OSCE Special Monitoring Mission to Ukraine (SMM), especially around the outskirts of Donetsk city, around Horlivka and between Debaltseve and Svitlodarsk. On 30 January and 2 February the number of ceasefire violations reached more than 1,000.
- The SMM noted a high number of weapons present throughout the conflict zone and observed that weapons previously recorded at holding areas and permanent storage sites were missing.
- The Mission experienced numerous freedom-of-movement restrictions, mostly in areas not controlled by the Government.
- On 3 February the SMM received 20 armoured vehicles donated by the European Union. The Mercedes G-type vehicles will be used by teams in the east of Ukraine. More here: www.osce.org/ukraine-smm/220086
