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EU Response to the High Commissioner on National

Minorities

The European Union warmly welcomes Ambassador Vollebaek back to the

Permanent Council and thanks him for his comprehensive report. The EU

greatly appreciates his commitment and that of his staff to the work of the

Office.

As regards the situation in Georgia, the EU agrees with the HCNM that the

right of return of IDPs and refugees to the Georgian regions of Abkhazia and

South Ossetia is a priority. We reiterate our call for unhindered access for the

High Commissioner to these regions. The EU also agrees with the HCNM's view

that the Georgian-speaking population in these regions must be able to

exercise all their rights, especially the right to education, and that they should

not be alienated from the other parts of Georgia.

We also support the High Commissioner's focus on other issues in Georgia,

such as the integration of the Armenian and Azeri minorities, and the return of

Meskhetians. With regard to the latter, the EU supports the HCNM in his plea

to the Georgian authorities to extend the deadline for application by all those

wishing to return beyond the end of this year.

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We welcome the High Commissioner's initiative to organize a round table in

Odessa that allowed an informal 5+2 meeting concerning the conflict in

Republic of Moldova.

The EU supports the efforts of the HCNM as regards Ukraine and encourages

the state authorities as well as minority representatives to continue their co-

operation with the High Commissioner. The EU notes with particular interest

his statement on the draft law on formerly deported people.

The European Union remains committed to playing a leading role in ensuring

stability in Kosovo, also through the EULEX and the EUSR. In this respect the

EU shares the High Commissioner's assessment of the importance of the

implementation of the laws which are crucial for the process of reconciliation

and the functioning of Kosovo as a multi-ethnic society.

The EU very much welcomes the HCNM's visit to Serbia to assess the situation

facing national minorities, including in Vojvodina and South Serbia, and echoes

his call, notwithstanding the steps taken, for a more proactive approach on the

part of the Serbian authorities.

The EU welcomes the progress made by Croatia in key areas relating to

national minorities.

The EU has noted that Kazakhstan is in the process of amending its electoral

legislation. We hope that Kazakhstan will follow-up the recommendations made

by the HCNM, as well as consult with the ODIHR.

The EU encourages Turkmenistan to engage in a meaningful dialogue with the

HCNM in order to improve the situation of minorities in that country.

the HCNMs efforts aimed at their dissemination through regional conferences.

The recommendations are all the more topical because of the events of August

this year in Georgia. When states have tried to use ethnic, linguistic or

religious groups beyond their borders as levers to exert political or even

military power, the consequences have often been tragic. As the HCNM has

pointed out, and as the Recommendations on Minorities in Inter-State

Relations point out, states must be guided by responsibility and the will to

build confidence in dealing with minority issues in their inter-state relations.

This requirement of responsibility and confidence is at the heart of our OSCE

commitments.
