A vulnerabilities-based approach

- IOM remains committed to combatting human trafficking as a specific crime
- IOM is also committed to ensuring that all migrants who have experienced violence, exploitation or abuse — whether or not they were trafficked — have access to appropriate protection and assistance services
- IOM is also deeply committed to effective programming to prevent trafficking in persons and other forms of violence, exploitation and abuse from occurring



Determinants of migrant vulnerability model



- An ecological approach
 examining individual,
 household/family, community
 and structural levels
- Risk and protective factors at each level
- Vulnerability based on the interaction of these factors
- Has a predictive purpose



Assistance to vulnerable migrants framework

- Requires specific interventions at each level
- Requires involvement of a broad range of actors
- E.g., psychological support for at risk individuals; cash-based interventions for atrisk families; community stabilization for atrisk communities; rule of law for affected countries
- These interventions are mutually reinforcing
- Meant to prevent trafficking, violence, exploitation and abuse as well as to respond to it





Deploying the DoMV in IOM operations

- Expanding protection pathways by building upon anti-trafficking interventions (e.g., NRMs, NPAs)
- Mainstreaming vulnerability assessments and pathways to protection within return operations
- Identifying vulnerabilities within transit and high-flow contexts
- Addressing vulnerabilities and trafficking in times of crisis
