Teresa Ribeiro

The Representative on Freedom of the Media.

Teresa Ribeiro, of Portugal, is the fifth Representative on Freedom of the Media. She has vast political, diplomatic, human rights and media experience.

Prior to this position, she was Secretary of State of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Portugal, while serving as President of the National Commission for Human Rights.

She was also Secretary of State for European Affairs at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Portugal and Deputy Secretary General at the Union for the Mediterranean, positions that gave her extensive experience in dealing with the EU institutions and Member States, as well as with its close neighbourhood.

Throughout her career, Teresa Ribeiro has held different positions in media, both in Portugal and in multilateral organizations, such as President of the Institute of the Media of Portugal, Chairperson of the Steering Committee on Mass Media of the Council of Europe, as well as co-founder and first elected President of the Executive Board of Obercom – Media Observatory.

She holds a degree in Philosophy from the University of Lisbon.









Ton van den Brandt

Principal Adviser to the OSCE Representative on Freedom of the Media

Ton van den Brandt is Principal Adviser to the OSCE Representative on Freedom of the Media. He holds a degree in Dutch law and (cum laude) in International Law, and in Journalism. Van den Brandt worked as a journalist for a national newspaper and a weekly magazine for many years, and is the published author of two journalistic books.

Van den Brandt worked as an ad interim legal adviser with the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs and with the Netherlands Red Cross, before taking up a position as senior political adviser with Amnesty International. Before moving to the OSCE, he led and managed the Communications Department of the Amsterdam District Court of Law. In his free time, he chaired the Dutch branch of the International Commission of Jurists and was a member of the Supervisory Board of the Netherlands Helsinki Committee.

Damian Tambini

Dr Damian Tambini is Distinguished Policy Fellow in the Department of Media and Communications at LSE, where he also serves as Programme Director for the MSc Media and Communications (Governance).

Dr Tambini is an expert in media and communications regulation and policy, and active in policymaking as well as academic research. He is frequently called to give evidence to parliamentary committees and provide formal and informal policy advice to government. From 2014-2015 he served on the UK Government Expert Panel advising on the value of electromagnetic spectrum. He was called to give evidence to the Leveson Inquiry in 2012, and from 2009-2010 he served on the Communications Consumer Panel, a non-executive role at the communications regulator Ofcom.

Dr Tambini was inaugural Director of the Media Policy Project. From June 2002-August 2006 Dr Tambini was Head of the Programme in Comparative Media Law and Policy at Oxford University. Before that he was director of the IPPR Media Policy Project (1999-2002), Postdoctoral Fellow at Nuffield College, Oxford (1998). Lecturer, Humboldt University, Berlin (1997-8), and researcher at the European University Institute, Florence, Italy (PhD 1996).

Dr Tambini's research interests include media and telecommunications policy and democratic communication. He is the author of many articles on media and communications regulation and policy and author/editor of several books. He Co-Edited 'Digital Dominance: The Power of Google, Amazon, Facebook and Apple.' (Oxford University Press 2018). He co-wrote 'Codifying Cyberspace (Routledge, 2008), coedited 'Cyberdemocracy' (Routledge 1998) and 'Citizenship, Markets, and the State' (Oxford University Press 2000). Other publications include: 'Nationalism in Italian Politics' (Routledge 2001), 'Collective Identities in Action: Theories of Ethnic Conflict' (Ashgate, September 2002); 'New News: Impartial Broadcasting in the Digital Age' (edited by D. Tambini and J. Cowling, IPPR 2002) and 'Privacy and the Media' (IPPR, December 2003).

Isabella Kurkowski

Isabella Kurkowski is a Managing Director of the EU project COPE "Covering Cohesion Policy in Europe – Training MOOC for European Journalism Students" since 2023, as well as an international media development expert and lecturer at the Journalism department at the Technical University Dortmund, Germany. She has supported the implementation of media self-regulatory institutions in several countries.

Kurkowski worked from 2020 to 2022 as the regional coordinator for the MENA region at the Erich Brost Institute for International Journalism and established the Programme in cooperation with Prof. Dr. Susanne Fengler "Media Accountability in the MENA region", which covered countries as Algeria, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Morocco, Sudan, Syria and Tunisia. She was in 2022 also interim Editor-in-Chief of the European Journalism Observatory. From 2014-2019 Kurkowski worked as Country Representative of DW Akademie in Myanmar and from 2007-2013 as Advisor to the Executive Director of the Press Council in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Prior to this she was a Programme Manager at the Institut für Auslandsbeziehungen, being the German intermediate of the Stability Pact for Southeast Europe under the EU Media Task Force and responsible for media projects in 11 countries. Kurkowski is providing consultancy to OSCE, UNESCO, EU Commission and Council of Europe.









Katerina Sinadinovska

Katerina Sinadinovska obtained degree in journalism from the St. Cyril and Methodius University in Skopje in 2008. She is currently the assistant - editor in chief of Kapital, a weekly business and political magazine for which she has been working since 2010. She is also an author and editor of the TV project "Agenda 35" broadcasted on the national public television, an educational program about the reforms that will have to be adopted during the negotiation process with the EU. Before joining Kapital, Katerina worked as a journalist for two TV stations in Skopje - "Kanal 5" and "Alfa TV". Earlier, from 2004 to 2006 she worked as a journalist in the newspaper Vecer.

In 2015, Katerina was one of the founders of the Council of Media Ethics (CMEM) and elected as a President of the Managing Board. In March 2018, Katerina was re-elected and given a new mandate to run the organization for the next four years. Katerina Sinadinovska has contributed to professional trainings and conferences on media freedom, media ethics and literacy, and political and economic influence in the media sector, both in the country and abroad.



Maida Bahto Kestendžić

Ms Maida Bahto Kestendžić, graduated at the University of Sarajevo Faculty of Law. Working in the Press and Online Media Council in Bosnia and Herzegovina past ten years, at different positions but most of the time dealing with complaints of citizens on unprofessional print and online media reporting.

Currently she is a Project coordinator at Press and Online Media Council in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Maida possesses extensive experience in media self-regulation, media law and coordination of different kinds of projects promoting freedom of expression.

She previously worked in the Ministry of Defence of Bosnia and Herzegovina, the Tax Administration of Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina and USAID Streamlining Permits and Inspections Regimes Activity Project in Bosnia and Herzegovina.









Gordana Novaković

Gordana Novaković is the Secretary General of the Press Council in Serbia since the founding of this self-regulatory body in 2011.

She has lectured at numerous meetings focusing on professional ethics and media self-regulation in Serbia and abroad that were organized by the Council of Europe, OSCE, UNESCO, and the associations of journalists of Serbia. She trains university students, journalists and representatives of the judiciary in media ethics, and she is also active in lobbying the government to advance self-regulation.



Paula Petričević

Paula Petričević is a philosopher, publicist, feminist, and peace activist. She earned her degree in Philosophy from the University of Belgrade and later obtained a Master's degree in Political Science. Currently, she is pursuing her PhD at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Belgrade.

Paula's professional background includes working as a program director for the Center for Civic Education and as a lecturer in Women's Studies at ANIMA - Center for Women's and Peace Education in Kotor. She is also a high school philosophy teacher and an ombudswoman for the daily newspaper "Vijesti" (since 2015) and the weekly magazine "Monitor" (since 2014).

Her research interests focus on gender issues, the history of the women's movement in Montenegro, media representation of women, and media ethics. She has contributed numerous articles and book chapters on these topics to both domestic and international publications. In 2019, Paula also served as an editor of the KotorArt Philosophers' Square.

During 2019, Darko served as Liaison Officer/Prosecutor at International Residual Mechanism for Crime Tribunals in The Hague, Netherlands, for Prosecutor office of Bosnia and Herzegovina and all Cantonal and District Prosecutors' Offices in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Since May 2021 by decision of High Judicial and Prosecutorial Council of Bosnia and Herzegovina he has been appointed as Cantonal prosecutor at Cantonal Prosecutor's Office of Canton Sarajevo. He is director of the documentary film "Hero of 1914" and the documentary series "Apis". He is the lecturer on the multidisciplinary non-formal education program "Future Studies" conducted by the Belgrade Open School.



Mladen Milutinović

Mladen Milutinović is known as one of the owners and key figures in the Montenegrin media landscape. Mladen Milutinović was born on February 19, 1964. He completed elementary school in Sarajevo and attended high school (gymnasium) in Podgorica. He then graduated from the Faculty of Law in Podgorica in 1990.

His work experience began in 1990 at the Directorate of Public Revenues, where he served as the secretary of the Directorate of Public Revenues of the Republic of Montenegro until 1996. Since 1997, Milutinović has been a co-owner and co-founder of the media company Jumedia Mont Ltd, together with Duško Jovanović. After Duško Jovanović's assassination in 2004, Milutinović also assumed the role of executive director.

This media company operates in the field of journalism, publishing, and broadcasting on two radio stations, Radio D and Radio D+. Jumedia Mont also owns the news portal Dan. As the editor-in-chief of the daily newspaper "Dan," he has played a significant role in its management and editorial policy.









Nabeelah Shabbir

Nabeelah Shabbir is a British-Pakistani journalist and Senior Research Associate at the International Center for Journalists (ICFJ) and co-editor of the November 2022 ICFJ/UNESCO report *The Chilling: A global study of online violence against women journalists*. At The Guardian, she shared a British Journalism Award in 2015 with the "Keep it in the Ground" team and has a European Young Journalist award for her writing in Kosovo in 2008. She is co-author of a series of reports at the Reuters Institute for the Study of Journalism on digital-born news media in Europe and innovation in media in the Global South. She has worked at the Financial Times, The Correspondent and Twitter amongst others, and has lived in Cologne, Brussels, Paris, London, Oxford, and Amsterdam.

With over twenty-four years of experience in media regulation, his scope of work includes licensing and content program monitoring, distribution and content providers, freedom of expression, hate speech, media and information literacy, and copyrights.

He contributed to the process of establishing convergent regulatory authority from its inception phase and currently follows closely the topics related to new technologies and challenges related to digitalization and audio-visual policy. Mr. Povlakić was a member of the Forum on digital terrestrial broadcasting transition in Bosnia and Herzegovina. He was also one of the founders of the Internet Governance Forum in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Since 2006, Mr. Povlakić acts as one of the Bureau's Vice-Chairs of the Steering Committee on Media and Information Society (CDMSI) of the Council of Europe.



Laura's litigation practice focuses on defending SLAPP victims in the trial courts and on appeal. She advises an extensive array of content providers including online and traditional newspapers, magazines, radio and broadcasters, cable television stations, production companies and music and sports entities. Laura was the lead author and negotiator for four of the most significant pieces of First Amendment legislation in recent history in Texas - the reporters' privilege, the Anti-SLAPP statute, the retraction statute, and the third party allegation rule. All of these laws are designed to promote and protect free speech rights in Texas.




Maja Ficovic

With an outstanding track record of producing three TV documentaries in partnership with the Balkan Investigative Reporting Network in BiH, Zlatan has successfully implemented several media projects aimed at promoting media reporting on important subjects of public importance such as transitional justice, corruption, organized crime, and terrorism.

In his current role at the OSCE, Zlatan skillfully manages the Freedom of the Media portfolio by vigilantly monitoring attacks on journalists and media outlets, providing valuable strategic and policy guidance for the organization's engagement in media freedom, and designing impactful projects aimed at advancing the media landscape in BiH. Additionally, in 2022, he launched the annual Media Law School programme with the Faculty of Law at the University of Sarajevo and spearheaded the development of a specialized master's degree programme in media law.

Velimir Delovski


Velimir Delovski is a human rights lawyer who gained an extensive experience while working as Assistant Lawyer with the Registry of the European Court of Human Rights at Strasbourg, Associate with the Office of the Macedonian Government Agent before the ECtHR, as well as a consultant on various projects carried out by the OSCE, the Council of Europe and the AIRE Centre London, which aimed at improving the national implementation of the European Convention on Human Rights by capacity building of the relevant judicial institutions in N. Macedonia and in the Western Balkans region. Under the EU and the Council of Europe's Horizontal Facility project on Freedom of Expression and Freedom of Media (JUFREX 2) he adapted to the national context two online courses developed under the program for Human Rights Education for Legal Professionals (HELP)- on freedom of expression and protection and safety of journalists. Moreover, he prepared a detailed review of the case-law of domestic courts in this area which provided specific recommendations on how to ensure full compliance of the national jurisprudence with the European standards.
